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June 17, 2019 Meeting

Meeting opened at 5:30 pm

Daniels moved; Wallace 2nd; the Board voted to approve the manifest dated June 17, 2019 for payroll/accounts payable in the amount of \$8,014.81 for the week of June 7, 2019-June 13, 2019.

Wallace moved; Bersaw 2nd; the Board voted to approve the building permit for Map 405 Lot 114.

Daniels moved; Bersaw 2nd; Board voted to approve an abatement refund in the amount of \$1039.98 for Map 202 Lot 043 per recommendation from Avitar Associates of New England, Inc.

Wallace moved; Bersaw 2nd; Board voted to approve an abatement in the amount of \$143.79 for Map 202 Lot 027 Sub 024, owners have left with no forwarding address-unable to collect.

Bersaw moved; Wallace 2nd; Board voted to approve the appointments of John Randall and Andrew Powers to the Conservation Commission. Terms to expire March 2022.

Bersaw moved; Daniels 2nd; Board signed Dog Warrant to be returned to Town Clerk.

Letter received from The State of New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, an Annual Summary Report indicates there are several private water supplies adjacent to and/or presumably down gradient of the dissolved bedrock contaminant plume that have not be monitored in the last 5 years. NHDES are requesting water testing on the following parcels: Map 201 Lot 008, 042, 045, 046, 048, 061, and 063. This is in reference of the former 4 Corners Store LUST Project #24097 DES site #199206008 regarding the original discovery of petroleum hydrocarbons discharge on August 19, 2005.

Letter from Jeanie Dietsch, NH Senate District 9, in reference to the 2020-2021 state budget passed by the Senate last week. The Senate budget dedicates most state investment in public schools, targeted toward needy districts. For Richmond the amount will be \$95,609.00 in 2020, and \$143,417.00 in 2021. In addition the budget delivers \$40 million statewide over the biennium in unrestricted revenue redistribution that towns may use for lowering property taxes. For Richmond, that amount is \$40,325.48 to be distributed over the FY 2020-2021 biennium. At this time, the Senate has passed the budget, but the House has not.

Harrington submitted email from a resident in regards to the frequency that Avitar Associates of New England, Inc. have visited their property. Harrington to follow up with residents.
